## **Community Risk Reduction**

### **Public Safety Education**

During the month of March , there were 3 public education events and 4 joint inspections with the State Fire Marshall office. The Fire Department visited 13 homes for smoke alarms installation in the city and township, the final installs as part of the grant program through Safe Kids through a grant from Safe Kids of Greater Toledo. Crews have started the fire safety inspection process for 2015, and completed 91 inspections and re-inspections.

Chief Froelich provided Fire Safety Inspection continuing education to all crews in March, attended meetings to start the planning for the Mock accidents events at Northview and Southview HS's, attended the Campus Fire Safety/Fire Code Expo Conference in Columbus for 2 days. Consulted with both police departments and school administration regarding updates from the Fire Marshal's office concerning school fire and safety drills and worked with the administrative assistants planning our preparation at the Sylvania Business Expo.

## **Building and Project Plan Reviews**

### **Notable Projects**

Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction conducted 21 plan reviews in March, 3 license inspections for preschool , daycare facilities and/or home inspections for Adoption and Foster Care, 4 consultation visits to assist local businesses in safety planning or to answer code questions regarding a planned project, 12 final acceptance tests for installed or upgraded fire protection systems or new businesses and assisted 4 business in placing keys in the Knox Box System on their property. There were no Freedom of Information Act Requests.

**2015 MARCH Training Report**

Your Sylvania Fire-EMS has highly trained professionals that conduct extensive year-round training activities to maintain and improve their skills in a variety of disciplines.

The Fire Training Bureau strives to provide a challenging mix of hands-on and classroom training, as well as up-to-date knowledge to help prepare our personnel to perform the wide variety of missions they may be assigned as the role of the Firefighter-Paramedic continues to evolve.

March kicked off with the quarterly Fire Inspector CE, which covered our Commercial Building Inspection Program (CBIP), and electrical hazards. D/C Froelich and Lt. Boyers presented this information.

The bi-annual Firehouse and Administrative Procedures update was covered by D/C Ramm and Jennifer Howard.

In-Service Training on the new Drager Pac 7000 Hydrogen Cyanide (HCN) gas meter was conducted, along with a hands-on review of our current iTX and M-40 4-gas meters.

Competencies were performed for the Station Cascade System that is used to fill our SCBA Air Cylinders in-house, as well as the system located in Air-64, which is utilized as a mobile fill station for our SCBA Air Cylinders and carried equipment for the Fire Investigators.

The month concluded with a practical review of all our Apparatus with direction from Al Hasenfratz that will definitely increase our overall proficiency, as well as reduce maintenance costs.



## **2015 March Training Report**

Al also worked with the crews at Station 4 to review important issues and procedures in regards to T64 that will be instrumental for our Training Program. We covered setting the aerial up and every imperative detail that will increase both the safety of our personnel and the longevity of T64. Additionally, Al conducted invaluable over the road driving that definitely will be an asset to anyone who drives our apparatus, especially TW63 and T64.

The Lucas County EMS Paramedic CE for the month of March focused on OB/GYN Emergencies.

Additional training was obtained by individuals through:

- The Allen County Fire Chief's Assn., Inc.
- The National Fire Academy
- On-Line through the Ohio Fire Academy OFA-24/7 training site.

The ability to improve our service is generated through many ideas and initiatives that originate from our personnel. It is their values, energy, commitment, and compassion that drive many of the Fire Training Bureau's functions, programs, and activities that support the accomplishment of our mission of providing excellent service to the community.

## **EMS Agency: LS # 6 and TFRD DOS 02/08/15**

- 62 y/o male s/p knee replacement two weeks prior collapsed in front of spouse at kitchen table. She was guided by LCEMS dispatch to start CPR. 1<sup>st</sup> responders from TFRD defibrillated patient at least six times prior to arrival of LS 6.
- Patient received treatment for VF arrest from a team including Medics Todd Walters and Cliff Reeves along with 1<sup>st</sup> responders from TFRD. Large inferior-posterior STEMI noted on 1<sup>st</sup> ECG done in Toledo EC. He was taken straight to cath lab.
- Patient received three bare metal stents to his RCA after a thrombectomy was done to remove clot from the affected artery. He received the induced hypothermia treatment after the emergent heart cath. He was discharged home to his family with a good neurologic prognosis on 2/15/15.

Thank you all for being a part of the chain of survival for this man.
