Community Risk Reduction

Public Safety Education

During the month of September , there were 3 public education event and we installed smoke alarms for (1) family this month. The Fire Department assisted at (9) School Fire Drills We also had (6) Consult Sessions with local businesses and schools regarding Safety.

Building and Project Plan Reviews

Notable Projects

Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction conducted 12 plan reviews in September, 4 license inspections for preschool , daycare facilities and/or home inspections for Adoption and Foster Care, 7 final acceptance tests for installed or upgraded fire protection systems or new businesses. There were 4 Freedom of Information Act Requests (4042 Holland-Sylvania , 5411 Roan, 4430 Holland-Sylvania, 6127 Monroe). The Fire Crews completed 360 inspections and re-inspections in September. Plans were also worked on for our Fire Safety Festival and School Safety Week Education.

FIRE TRAINING BUREAU

Achieving proficiency and professionalism through training and education.

Your Sylvania Township Fire Department has highly trained professionals that conduct Extensive year-round training activities to maintain and improve their skills In a variety of disciplines.

The Fire Training Bureau strives to provide a challenging mix of hands-on and classroom Training, as well as up-to-date knowledge to help prepare our personnel to Perform the wide variety of missions they may be assigned as the role of the Firefighter-Paramedic continues to evolve.

September continued with evolutions focusing on T64. All members set up and bedded the aerial, worked with relay pumping from an engine, flowing water from the Ladder Pipe, correct positioning to affect a rescue, and operating all equipment.

A pre-plan walk-thru and familiarization was conducted at the New Mercy Emergency & Diagnostic Center building at 3100 N. King Rd. This included a review of the Fire Protection Systems, Exits, Fire Lanes and sensitive equipment/locations, as well as important issues pertaining to each of the diagnostic areas.

The annual hose testing started and crews continued to work on getting this important task completed. We reviewed the maintenance and operating procedures of our Nieder Gas powered Delta Hydro Hose Tester with input and instruction from our certified Master Emergency Vehicle Technician Al Hasenfrantz. Al is very familiar with our equipment and procedures and has been instrumental in developing our Training Competency Guidelines (TCG) that deal with our Apparatus and Equipment.

Al also attended the 23rd Annual Emergency Apparatus Maintenance Symposium. Each September, OAEVT sponsors a one-week all-encompassing symposium at the Ohio Fire Academy that focuses on the challenge of maintaining the equipment Firefighters and Paramedics rely on day in and day out under the most severe conditions. This included classroom sessions, extensive hands-on training, and interaction with the manufacturers.



Lucas County EMS conducted our bi-annual American Heart Association Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) certification, which is a requirement for all LCEMS Paramedics.

Additional training this month:

CERT Training covering Fire Suppression was conducted at Northview High School with the Med-Tech Program.

Haz-Mat Training with the Ohio EPA.

Lucas County MCI Module-5 Train-the-Trainer course.

Over 1200 hours of training were conducted during the month of August.

The ability to improve our service is generated through many ideas and initiatives that originate from our personnel. It is their values, energy, commitment, and compassion that drive many of the Fire Training Bureau's functions, programs, and activities that support the accomplishment of our mission of providing excellent service to the community.



LUCAS COUNTY EMS R.A.C.E. **ON-SCENE TO TRANSPORT** REPORT

Lucas County instituted **Rapid Arterial Occlusion Event** [RACE] July 1, 2015.

Lucas County has designated the University of Toledo Medical Center [UTMC], St. Vincent Mercy Medical Center [STV] and ProMedica Toledo Hospital [TOL] as our local RACE facilities.

Lucas County has had 69 documented RACE patients to date [September 23, 2015]. July 19, August 27 and September 23; the breakdown is as follows:
