Community Risk Reduction

Public Safety Education

During the month of November, there were (5) public education events (the majority were for Fire Prevention Week) and we installed smoke alarms for (6) homes this month. The Fire Department assisted at (5) School Fire Drills We also had (3) Consult Sessions with local businesses and schools regarding Safety.

Building and Project Plan Reviews

Notable Projects

Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction conducted (15) plan reviews in November, (6) license inspections for preschool , daycare facilities and/or home inspections for Adoption and Foster Care, (10) final acceptance tests for installed or upgraded fire protection systems or new businesses. There were (5) Freedom of Information Act Requests (3310 Holland-Sylvania, 7518 Sylvania, 7510 Sylvania, 6629 Central, 7640 Sylvania). The Fire Crews completed 286 inspections and re-inspections in November.

Chief Froelich attended two meetings in Columbus, one as part of the Ohio Fire Officials Association as State Fire Marshal's office begins the process of updating the Ohio Fire Code, the other was a hearing on temporary door locking code changes for school facilities. All schools (public, parochial and charter) in the city and township were inspected in November.

The Fire Training Bureau strives to provide a challenging mix of hands-on and classroom Training, as well as up-to-date knowledge to help prepare our personnel to Perform the wide variety of missions they may be assigned as the role of the Firefighter-Paramedic continues to evolve.

Our crews conducted Fire Safety Presentations & Station Tours throughout the month. We also held our Fourth Annual Fire Safety Festival. This was an idea brought forth by Lt. Chad Morris , and has expanded into a much anticipated event by the community.

Annual hose testing was completed this month as well.

We were honored to host a “Basic Structural Training for Firefighters” class developed by Tim O’Brien, PE of the Benchmark Engineering Group, who has over 20 years of structural engineering experience in the design & construction of residential, commercial, institutional & industrial buildings. He also has worked for the damage evaluation and reconstruction of state, county & municipal buildings and infrastructure after major disasters around the country, and is the current LEPC Board President. Tim has developed this interactive class for Firefighters with the intent is to give us tools to recognize building construction, and how the structure will be affected by a fire.
