Community Risk Reduction

Public Safety Education

During the month of December, there were (5) public education events (the majority were for Fire Prevention Week) and we installed smoke alarms for (4) homes this month. The Fire Department assisted at (3) School Fire Drills including one install of an alerting device for a hearing impaired couple, provided by the State Fire Marshal's office.

Building and Project Plan Reviews

Notable Projects

Fire Prevention/Community Risk Reduction conducted (10) plan reviews in December, (2) license inspections for preschool, daycare facilities and/or home inspections for Adoption and Foster Care, (8) final acceptance tests for installed or upgraded fire protection systems or new businesses. There were (1) Freedom of Information Act Requests (5437 Alexis). The Fire Crews completed 173 inspections and re-inspections in December.

Chief Froelich conducted pre-incident planning training at the New ProMedica Health & Wellness Center on Monroe St., as this is one of the larger buildings in the fire district and will have a high occupancy level of employees and customers.

FIRE TRAINING BUREAU

Achieving proficiency and professionalism through training and education.

Your Sylvania Township Fire Department has highly trained professionals that conduct Extensive year-round training activities to maintain and improve their skills In a variety of disciplines.

The Fire Training Bureau strives to provide a challenging mix of hands-on and classroom Training, as well as up-to-date knowledge to help prepare our personnel to Perform the wide variety of missions they may be assigned as the role of the Firefighter-Paramedic continues to evolve.

Since we had much warmer temperatures than usual, December started with Fire Instructor Teach backs at KRTF to ensure our newest Instructors had fulfilled the requirements to receive their certifications while we prepared for the new recruits. Hands-on evolutions covered Hose loads and pulls while focusing on competencies and standardization.

Capt. Frye met with ODOT’s Mike Leach in regards to the changes to the Central Ave. on and off-ramps, the 475-23 Interchanges, and upcoming construction issues. Information from ODOT was incorporated into the Training updates.

The Fire Department hosted the Incident Safety Officer Course taught through the Ohio Fire Academy by Retired TFD Battalion Chief of Training & Safety. Mark Hertzfield. D/C Ramm, along with many of our Lieutenants and Acting Lieutenants attend the course to increase their knowledge base and can now function as additional Safety Officers.

Crews conducted Operational Proficiency Drills at Chelsea Place Apartments and walk-throughs at the new ProMedica Building on Monroe St.



Our 3 new Recruits: Greg Shadler, Jaime Sesock, and Kurt Baumgartner began on December 21. The Recruit Training Program is what all new personnel will go through to acclimate themselves to the way in which Sylvania Fire-EMS chooses to run and manage the agency.

This incorporates the employee's entire first year while on Probation and includes:

- Phase 1: Academy
- Phase 2: Basic Shift Training/LS6 Ride Time and Certification
- Phase 3: ALS First Responder-Paramedic Integration
- Phase 4: BLS/ALS Transport
- Phase 5: Weekly Training Sessions, Monthly Reviews, & Completion of the Recruit Training Competency Guidebook.

Since we had favorable weather, the Recruits had the opportunity to conduct live Fire Training evolutions during December.

The Fire Training Bureau finished the year out with a review of the History of the Sylvania Township Fire Department by reviewing a PowerPoint full of pictures and information gleaned from numerous sources.

Over 1100 hours of training were conducted during the month of December.



EMS STEMI FOLLOW UP

EMS Agency: LS # 6 and STFD DOS 12/31/15

- 68 y/o male with previous MI, cardiac arrest and CABG surgery c/o onset chest pain for at least eight hours prior to EMS activation.
- Patient received treatment for ACS from a team including Paramedics Riggs, Perry and Scalzo along with FR from STFD. Initial ECG non-diagnostic. Converted to STEMI on subsequent ECG.
- Patient received total of six bare metal stents to his RCA/ posterior branch RCA which correlated with your interpretation of his ECG. He has complex coronary artery disease. He was discharged to home on 1/3/16.

E2B time (time of first medical contact to artery open) time was **92** minutes.

Thank you for your care of this patient.
